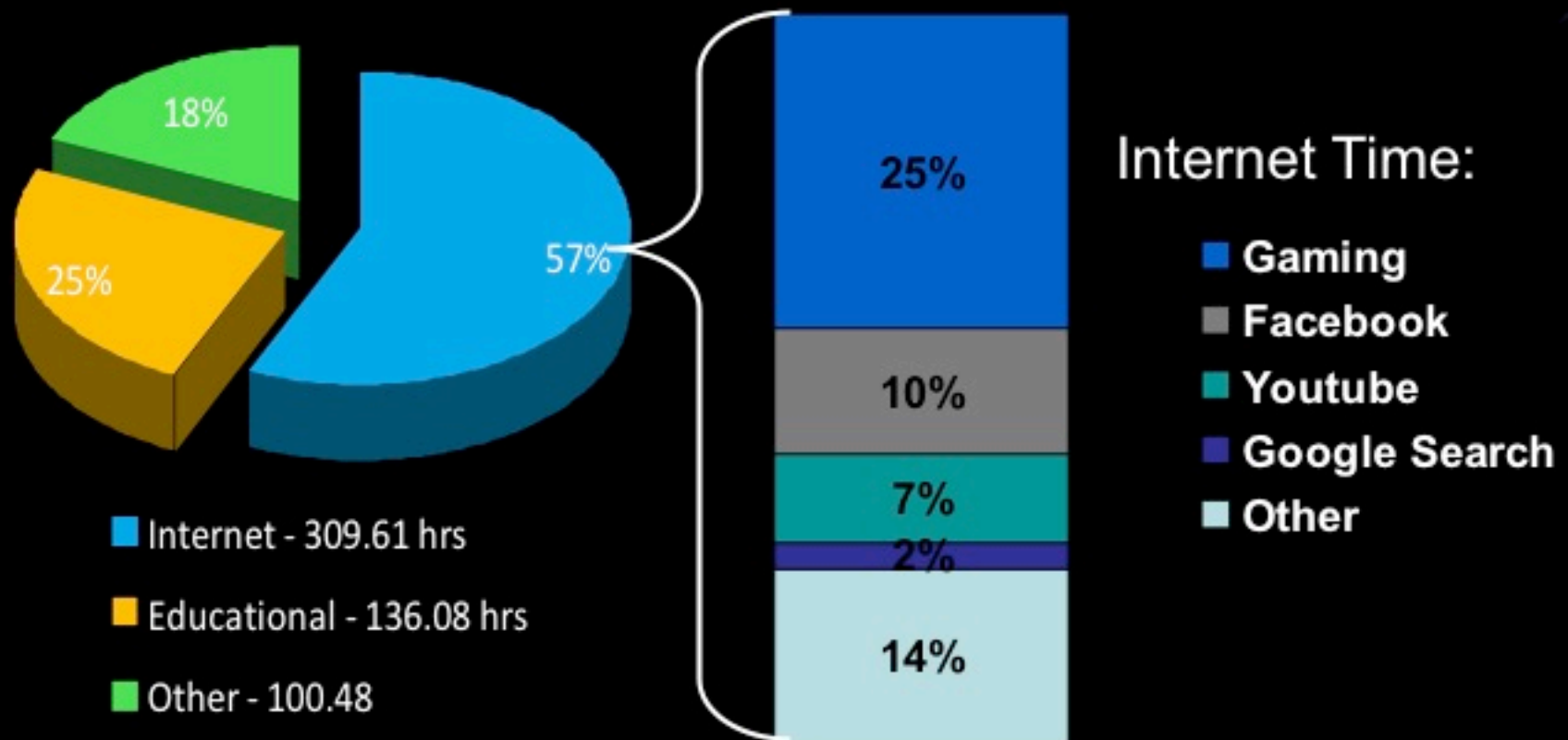

- This chart shows the computer use of programs in our computer lab over the course of 6 weeks of class (42 days, 546 active hours)

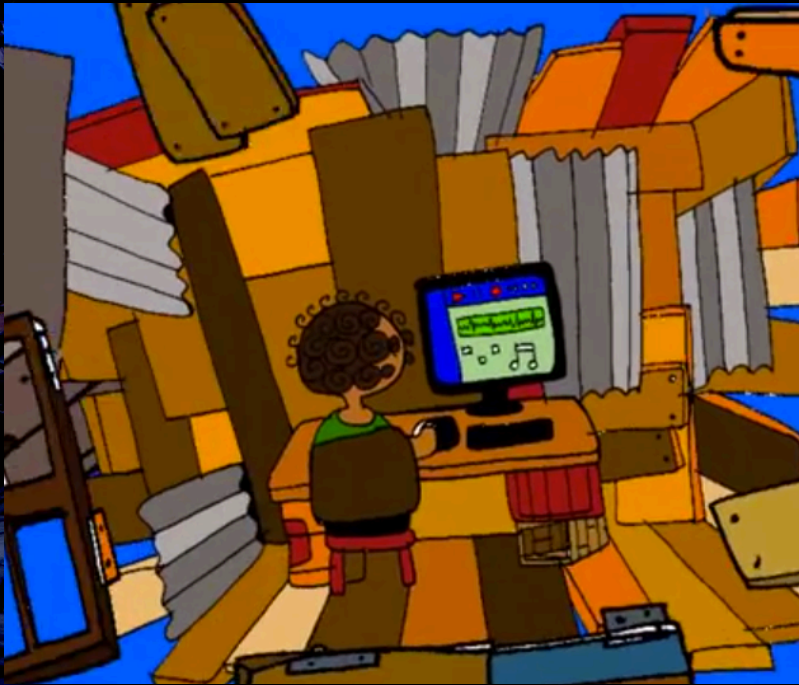
